I'm thinking of the writings of the youthful literary genius, LUDOVIT STUR, who visited Bautzen and other laces in Lusatia and stirred up especially the youth to a new day of freedom and progress in social, economic, and literary pursuits.

The above quote says that the Wendish (Serbstwo) will never die away. This is true when people are alive to the heritage that has been handed down to them and they are willing to do whatever is necessary to preserve and propogate that heritage. Yet the opposite is true - the path of least resistance. Let things happen as they will, without planning and sacrificing, and anything will die away.

More and more young people of Wendish descent are getting interested in their real "roots" and they are finding that their slavic backgrounds are fascinating, envigorating, dynamic, and motivating.

WENDISH FLOAT, "BEN NEVIS," WINS FIRST PLACE AWARD IN GIDDINGS GEBURTSTAG 109 PARADE. Since we are late with our appearance we can report that the Texas Wendish Heritage Society float, the replica of the "Ben Nevis," the English sailing ship used by the forefathers to immigrate across the Atlantic into the Gulf of Mexico, won wide acclaim at the Giddings Geburtstag 109 Parade in Downtown Giddings Saturday, October 11, 1980.

The TWHS took an active part in the two-day celebration at the Fairgrounds, two miles west of Giddings on Highway 290 The members were dressed in their Wendish Costumes as they conducted a beautifully decorated Booth... They sold Wendish Cook Books, Wendish Home-made Noodle, Vareny Cyr (Koch Kaese), Sauerkraut and Wieners, Wendish Dills, and Wendish Arts and Crafts items. A good time was had by all:

The Texas Wendish Heritage Society is dedicated to the preservation of our Wendish heritage. Now that we have a Museum, we need to gather and preserve the treasures, lest they disappear and be lost.

The heritage that we should preserve hall into three groups. One group are the ORAL TRADITIONS that we collect from the memories of some of our older Wends. They may include such happenings as habits and practices in the home and family life. It should also involve us in such practices as Confirmation, weddings, church customs, dress or attire, and various festivals. Some oddities may be remembered about food and food preparation.

The second type of information involves the gathering written information that may be gathered from books, bistories, etc. These may include letters, obituaries, and pictures. Pictures may include families, homes, churches,

and activities.

Lastly, we are interested in items that were part of the daily living, such as home furnishings, tools for their oprecions, and unusual items in their culture.
