WENDISH FEST 1994

The weather was perfect for our sixth annual Wendish Fest on September 25, 1994. Thanks to our willing workers (members and friends) for keeping our food lines running smoothly. We served 770 plates and had only a few waiting periods for "more good Wendish noodles". The ladies couldn't cook them fast enough.

Also a big "Thank you" for the volunteers setting up the tables and benches, washing them down, furnishing drinking water, ice, roping off the areas, and to everyone who helped in any way to make this event a success.

We appreciate the special prices for Kovanda's Czech Band through the courtesy of our member, Leland Miller of Fayetteville, and the speaker system through the courtesy of our member, Bryan Gersch.

The Rev. Dr. Eugene Krentz of Concordia University, River Forest, Illinois conducted the 8:30 a.m. service and the 10:00 a.m. service at St. Faul Lutheran Church. Dr. Lotar Balke from Drebkau, Lausitz presented a most interesting slide show and talk about the customs and folkdress of Lusatia on September 30 at the Museum. Thirty-three people attended, coming from Austin, San Antonio, Houston, and the local area. Luise Green translated and Elmer Zoch video taped the program. Dr. Balke also assisted at the Wendish Fest. He demonstrated the embossed technique of Wendish Easter eggs while Daphne Garrett demonstrated the batik wax technique.

They drove 1300 miles in Texas, showing him a wide variety of Texas sights, including the Alabama-Choushatta Indian Reservation in East Texas, Galveston, the LBJ Ranch, Fredericksburg and San Antonio.
