In Memoriam

Louise T. Peter

September 24, 1899 – December 25, 2001 During the Christmas holiday season the Wendish community in Texas laid to rest the matriarch of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society. Louise T. Peter, granddaughter of Rev. Johann Kilian, was buried in her birth town of Winchester on December 27, 2001.

Louise lived frugally, but gave generously based on the strength of her faith in God, her Wendish heritage, and her interest in education and music. She was happiest when she could give of her time, energy, and funds, and would do so with a mischievous sparkle in her eyes!

Louise was a fun person and always saw the best in everyone. She was very proud of her huge pecan trees and long row of gorgeous lilac bushes at her home in Wichita Falls. She once visited the church in Germany where her grandfather, Rev. Kilian, was minister before coming to Texas in 1854. She even shed a few tears at the thought of walking in the footsteps of her grandfather.

The Texas Wendish Heritage Society will be forever grateful for her generosity in funding the Peter Building at the Wendish Museum complex in Serbin. Following is an excerpt of Louise T. Peter's obituary courtesy of the *Fayette County Record*, La Grange, Texas.

Funeral services for Louise T. Peter, 102, were held Thursday, December 27, at 2 p.m. at St. Michael's Lutheran Church in Winchester. Burial was in the church cemetery. The Rev. Thomas Handrick of Wichita Falls and the Rev. Henry Wied Sr. of Winchester officiated. Born Sept. 24, 1899 in Winchester, she was the youngest child of John Albert and Theresia Martha (Kilian) Peter. Her grandfather was the Rev. Johann Kilian, the Lutheran pastor who led the Wendish people as they immigrated from eastern Germany on the ship, Ben Nevis, to resettle in Lee County. Peter was a resident of Houston for 17 years, associated with Anderson Clayton and Company in the Futures Department, lifelong member of the Lutheran Church, instrumental in funding the building of the Texas Wendish Heritage Museum located in Serbin, and a major donor of a building at Concordia Lutheran College in Austin, the Louise T. Peter Center named in her honor. She was preceded in death by her parents, six sisters and five brothers.

William John "Bill" Dube

November 21, 1913 – November 23, 2001. Bill was a former Katy, Texas city councilman and longtime local businessman decorated for combat valor in World War II. He was born in The Grove, Texas. Following the war, he settled in Katy and bought the old Pitts Grocery. Over the years he expanded the business to include variety and hardware goods and, eventually, clothing. He retired in 1990. He served as President of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society from January 1984 through December 1985. During his term he played a major role in shaping the organization during its early years.

Eugene Wukasch

July 12, 1921 – November 2, 2001. Eugene was born in Austin, Texas and was a well-known architect with a special interest in the rehabilitation of historic structures. Eugene was a long-time supporter and member of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society.

Walter G. S. Fehr

December 12, 1901 – December 28, 2001. Walter was the son of Herman Beno Fehr and Selma Kilian. His great-grandfather was Johann Kilian and his grandfather was Gerhardt Kilian, teacher at St. Paul's Lutheran School who helped design the pipe organ at St. Paul's Lutheran Church to play Wendish sheet music.

Ewald Hempel

January 20, 1905 – December 24, 2001. Ewald was a Life member of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society.

Wends Who Broke the Pattern

The large majority of Wends who migrated to Texas in 1854 either stayed with the core settlement around Serbin or followed several paths to neighboring communities. But there were also some who broke the pattern and their intimate association with the Wendish community. One of these families is that of Johann Sommer, listed as #109 on the Ben Nevis passenger list, which settled near Waldeck.

Several years ago when Gertrud Mahling was helping me gather letters of emigrant Wends she came across a set of letters written by Johann Sommer that tell the story of that family. The first of his letters is an important one because it includes information about the journey to Texas.

I know of only three other correspondents who left accounts. The most extensive accounts were written by Pastor Johann Kilian. The second account was written by Johann Teinert, advanced in age, and describing events as he remembered them. And the third was a German, August Haak, who left a diary that Dr. Joseph Wilson edited and published in *The Journal* of the German-Texas Heritage Society.

Following is the first of Johann Sommer's letters, as translated by William H. Nielsen:

[1855-1861] Sommer to Family [Mahling]

Dear Parents and Brothers and Sisters

Many greetings to you from me and my wife and children. God be praised that we are for the present fresh and hale and hearty.

I would like to inform you what has happened to me and my wife and how we are presently doing. The day after we departed from Bautzen we arrived at Hamburg at 11 o'clock. We had to stay in Hamburg for five days. After that we traveled by steamship from Hamburg to England to the large city of Hull. There we again boarded the train and traveled through Manchester to Liverpool. There we were quartered for four days. After that we joyfully boarded the large sailing vessel Ben Nevis. But after we were on it for several days, as we were all together, all the passengers, young and old, became so sick, that we did not know what to do. Nothing had been said before [illegible]. If I had not taken so much rum with me, the same could have happened to me as it did the other passengers.

On September 30 we arrived at Ireland specifically because of the sickly conditions. We remained in Ireland for four weeks. On October 22 we again boarded the ship. The sickness was so bad the first 5 days, that the majority were all sick, and my wife was so sick for seven days that I feared she would die; but with God's help she regained her health. In all 73 people died at sea because of a type of cholera that prevailed; and the situation was horrible to view because on many days 6 to 8 died and were tossed overboard.

We arrived at the city of Galveston on December 16. On the same day we disembarked from the sail ship and embarked on a steamship that traveled to Houston. We disembarked in Houston.

From Houston an American pastor [Caspar Braun] transported me to Industry, and I am housed near the town of Round Top, one hundred English miles from Houston.

I would like to inform you that I have excluded myself from the [Serbin] community, only because I had no work in the area; they live at least 12 miles from my house and I must consider how I can best survive. So I followed my own reason, built fireplaces, because masonry work is highly paid here, and I receive for one [illegible] wall one and one half dollars, and earn 12 to 14 dollars per week.

One dollar is as much as 1 Taler 13 Neugroschen according to German calculation. And now everyone here receives meat and bread three times daily. I have bought 100 Schefel of land. One Schefel costs 1 Taler 8 Neugroschen. My land is clear of debt. On my land there is all kinds of timber; cedar, oak, eleven kinds. I have my cultivated land on one side and the timber on the other side. The timber has been there since the creation of the world. On the average the trees are 12 to 15 feet tall and there is so much that my children and I won't lack wood as long as we live.

I have bought 4 cows with calves by their side. The best milk cow with calf costs 15 to 17 dollars. I have at times rented oxen, because horses here are very expensive. And I own 4 sows for breeding purposes. Just think all these have been acquired in this short time.

And I would like to have my parents and my brothers and sisters with me because here one does not need to work nearly as hard as in Germany and through sweat has earned things sooner. I am always working with American [English speaking] people, and they treat me well because of the work I do for them, for everywhere around here there is much sandstone with which I find it easy to work. I am also quite able to communicate with them in English. These American neighbors are quite well-to-do here in Texas and all have 20 to 30 slaves. These slaves are dark skinned and the hair on their heads is as fine as sheep's wool.

A number of nationalities are found living here. Among them is a wild tribe who are scantily clothed, almost naked, but some cover their shame with skins of wild animals. They live about a hundred miles from me, but I have seen them quite often. This year a small garden has been made in which corn, beans,[illegible] and potatoes are planted. These potatoes are a kind of potato which taste very sweet.

Since leaving Germany I have not seen any snow. Three time this winter we had a light frost. In April the heat is so great that work stops about the tenth hour and is taken up again later in the afternoon. This heat lasts until October. In February trees begin to bloom. Fruits of the garden are enjoyed in summer and in winter. As to types of soil, they are varied. We have sandy, loamy, salty, and swampy soil, but all are fertile. Many wild plants grow here. Wild plums, grapes, and others, many of them providing all abundance of enjoyable nourishment. The prairie grass stands as tall as a man so there is no need for feeding the animals. The milk cows come home in the evening on their own to be milked. Herdsmen are not needed – the cattle roam wherever they plan for the prairie is endless. The animals roam in mixed groups. Horses, cows, steers, goats, sheep may all be found in a group of a thousand or more. Many people let their animals roam the year round. To know to whom each animal belongs each owner must have a brand which is burned on each animal with a hot iron.

Male servants receive 15 to 20 dollars per month. Female servants [illegible] dollars. There is a great demand for servants so that here it is possible to acquire some property in a short time. There are no extra fees to be paid so that whatever one earns that is his. One may bargain and deal as one pleases. My area is not well settled. About 1/2 hour from me lives a Saxon from Mintschendorf at Immenburg and a few Americans. Here everyone must have a horse since distances are so great. To reach my church I must travel 4 miles.

Dear brother and sisters do come to me and don't let time slip away. And dear parents, come also. Here a midwife received 8 dollars per child that enter the world. And you my dear brother, when you are free of military service, come as you once promised, and do not bring too much cloth material along; rather linen which one cannot get here. Bring 4 to 6 pair of cloth pants. As for women's costumes [Trachten], sell them in Germany for they are not in fashion here. Buy colored linen and bring it along for cotton is cheaper here than in Germany. Boots are priced at 6 to 10 dollars. Women's shoes are 1 1/2 dollars. Be sure to bring blue and gray thread for me, two large [illegible], for local thread is very expensive, and the [illegible]. I will gladly pay you for all of it.

Do not bring too many cooking vessels along for these made here are better than those made in

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Germany. Keep all iron ware at home since it will cost too much freight. Bring woolen socks along for both men and women. Bring a spinning wheel along to spin cotton thread. Greet the parents of my wife and the brothers and sisters. Also greet Adreas Zeschang in [illegible]. All of you come to Texas and follow these [illegible]. A day laborer's wages are 1 1/2 dollars per day.

Dear parents, brothers, and sisters I have no desire to return to Germany for I am ten times better off than you. And I have a very good husband. You always told me that he would mistreat me but I do not wish for any other. [These last comments are in the same hand as the earlier portion of the letter.]

Membership is on the rise in 2002! As of January 21st we have 399 paid memberships, and have already surpassed our total for all of 2001. During 2001, the number of members dropped to 395, marking the first time since 1988 that the TWHS had less than 400 members. The year 1992 marked our highest membership level – 509.

During September 2001 we began a campaign to re-enroll former members. To-date, 76 former members have rejoined and we have received 44 new memberships. We are happy to report that this shows an increase over 2001 during which 47 former members rejoined and 34 new members joined.

Our goal for 2002 is 500 members, and we seem to be well on our way. We hope to add even more new members by sending an invitation to potential members. It will be a simple invitation to join the TWHS and will include a letter describing our organization and a membership card to complete and return.
