Wends Who Broke the Pattern

The following is another letter written by Johann Sommer to his family in Germany. It is probably typical of other letters sent back to Germany in the hope of enticing family members to join them in Texas. It also provides insights into which items were needed on the Texas frontier. The letter was written at the time of Lincoln's inaugural and as the nation was moving toward the Civil War. The war and Union blockade of the South prevented migration until the war's end in 1865.

In the next newsletter issue I will conclude with comments about Johann Sommer. In subsequent issues I will continue with other Wends who broke the pattern such as George Boback, Friedrich Matuschka, and Christian Kolba. As translated by William H. Nielsen and Bill Biar:

Long Prairie at Roundtop March 3, 1861

Dear Mother and Siblings!

With these lines I, my wife, and children are sending you heartfelt greetings, and heartily wish that these our lines would, upon reaching you, find you in good health. Concerning us we are all, God be praised, in good health and well, together with five children, three sons and two daughters. The last son was born January 25.

Dear Mother I can report to you that the things which you sent to me with Deo* from Preititz have been received, but the horseradish was dried up so that it could be rubbed to powder. But what I did not understand was that you did not write a few lines to let me know how you are doing. But it pleased my wife and me very much when Deo told us that you and my brother and sister have a desire to come to America. This you will not regret because living here is better than in Germany. I wonder if my brother will be able to come due to the military service.

Dear people, when you do come do not bring your women's Wendish jackets. You can bring handkerchiefs, coats, cloth of all sorts, also dresses as well as woolen coats and jackets, stockings, and blue linen aprons, embroidered quilts, linen cloth, apron strings and shoes women's shoes and slippers. For me and my wife you may bring for each a woolen knitted jacket, and for the children each two pair blue woolen stockings. I would like two scythes and a small spinning wheel to spin thread. To my sister I have this advice do not marry at home or on shipboard because she can have better luck here than in Germany. But to my brother I would say to get married there, as I did, and thus come to America with a woman who knows how to take hold of things. If it should be the case that you have your money at hand, do not loan it to anyone on the way but exchange all your money in Bremen since at this time German money is not worth as much here as there. If you can't come in springtime up to April 1st, then wait until the end of August or September for at that time traveling will be better because of yellow fever in Galveston. Supply yourselves for the voyage victuals, namely, some dried bread and also normal bread. Eat the fresh bread first, then the dried because the former will not keep very long. Take dried fruit, ham, some butter, also herrings, roasted coffee and also take something to drink, whatever is most salutary for you, like schnaps or rum. As for the drops, which you are to bring along. I have already informed you in a previous letter. My brother may wish to supply himself with smoking tobacco and some 2 thousand cigars. For me he might bring along a tobacco pipe made of wood and costing about a half dollar. He should also supply himself with several extra boots and bring several of the common German caps with visors and tulle of the gray sort for jackets and pants and some extra black silk scarfs. Bring some blacksmith tongs, bring only one manure fork and a grubbing hoe. Also an iron shovel without wooden handle

For yourself also bring some iron pots from 2 or 3 quarts in size [A Saxon Kanne equals .94 liter] and some smaller ones, several dozen coffee cups, a dozen round spoons, and bring horseradish along one more time because mine dried up. For this take a small bottle, filled with some water, and insert the horseradish into the hole and when the root has increased in size to fill the opening it can serve as a cork, thus making it possible to transport the plant without drying up.

Dear Mother, bring seeds of your herbs so that we can plant them here because those seeds here are costly to buy. I do not write this so that you could use them in the practice of midwife, but that you would use them in your home. Do not bring unnecessary things because of freight costs and because they can be bought here.

Dear Mother and brother and sisters, my church is nearby and we have a good preacher, who lives a half hour from here. Our services are only in German. You would probably want to know how things are going with me. I am satisfied here even though we suffered a drought this past year, but I cannot complain of any great need. Food and drink we did not lack and the coming year has begun well. My corn and wheat are looking good, perhaps even better than you would have in Germany. And I have wheat plants from which 55 - 65 stems grow up and in the field of 5 acres one stalk is as large as another. Corn also is doing well and is putting on ears so that we are hoping that by the middle of May we will have fresh corn bread to eat. And I also now have strawberries. The green trees are blooming profusely. I had lettuce all winter. Cucumbers, peas and flax are green and doing well. I am reminded of another thing, bring two dozen pipe stems, namely a dozen with curved stems and a dozen with straight stems.

Dear Mother, I would like to know why Brother Andreas does not write and tell me what he wants. In a previous letter I promised him land and home until he is able to buy his own. So far no letter. Could it be that he is so well-to-do that my offer does not tempt him. For I can see right plainly that he could do much better here. Here he could practice his profession unhindered and earn double as much as in Germany. No, I would say 3 times as much. I must also inform you that I have huilt a new house. At present Deo is staying with me and is finishing the building for me because he lives about 3 hours from me.

Dear people don't let selling your property cause you any sorrow for I have a business here which I would never trade for yours in Quatitz. Here we do not have expensive fees as you do in Germany, and whatever you harvest is yours to keep without giving anything to anyone.

Dear Mother if you are not coming soon then write me about all my siblings. What I would like to know is how they are doing. When you do write to me then write Texas correctly. Do not write Texa but Texas. I will close the letter with the hope that we will see each other in the future. Should it be that you will not come then my hope is that we will meet in yonder world of immortality where we will be free of worries and cares of this earthly life. Hold fast in remembrance to our Savior Jesus Christ and may it be well with you.

Membership Hits All-Time Record




As of April 19, we have 529 members, breaking the old record of 509 set in 1992. This compares to 395 members in 2001, which was our 15th highest membership year. The increase of 134 members is easily the largest increase in the 32-year history of the TWHS.

Growth has come from new members, both first-time and former who have rejoined. Currently we have 174 new members, compared to a typical year of 70 new members. The percentage of people renewing has also increased significantly.

Texas Wendish Heritage Society General Membership Meeting

February 17, 2002

President Eunice Dunk called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. in the Kilian Building of the Museum complex at Serbin, Texas on Sunday, February 17, 2002. Present were 22 members and 12 visitors.

Rev. Michael Buchhorn provided the opening devotion, stressing the importance of maintaining priorities in life. There is a tendency in modern times to put ourselves first, but this is not the way it should be. Our forebears set an example for us by allowing God to lead them and by honoring Him with the first fruits of their labors. Singing the hymn "God the Father, Son and Spirit" closed the devotion.

Rev. Elmer Hohle treated us to singing in Wendish select verses from the hymns "Oh Sacred Head Now Wounded," "Oh Dearest Jesus What Law Hast Thou Broken," "A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth," and "Abide O Dearest Jesus."

A motion was made, seconded and approved to accept the minutes of the November 18, 2001 meeting as presented in the newsletter.

George Boerger presented the 2001 actual and 2002 projected financial reports. It was noted that noodle sales for 2001 increased by 18%. A motion was made, seconded and approved to file the financial reports as presented.

George Boerger reported that the number of members had increased significantly for 2002. With the extra effort given to sending reminders and follow-up mailings, our membership is now 449. George also presented the new membership invitation and asked everyone to please send him names and addresses of potential new members to receive an invitation.

Evelyn Kasper reported that 615 pounds of noodles had been made thus far for 2002.

Evelyn Kasper reported that 5 luncheon tours have been planned for March, April and May. The

spring tour season is beginning and more tours are anticipated.

Evelyn Kasper reported that 35 members of the Chor Meja in Germany will arrive in Serbin on September 21 and will perform at the Wendish Fest. Volunteers are needed to provide housing for the choir members.

Eunice Dunk reported that the Walk-In Coffee was successful. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped with the event.

Eunice Dunk outlined some of the goals for 2002, which include increasing membership, improving the newsletter and membership meeting programs, producing a membership directory, electronically cataloging the archives, and developing a new museum exhibit. She also reminded everyone to visit the TWHS booth at the Folklife Festival in San Antonio in June.

There being no further business, the speakers were introduced. Dr. David Zersen, former president of Concordia University at Austin, spoke about Mato Kosyk, the Wendish poet. Dr. David Chroust of Texas A&M University spoke about Czech poet Josef Vaclav Sladek, who traveled through parts of Texas during 1869-1870.
