We are only a few weeks away from our Eleventh Annual Wendish Fest, September 26th. This year we celebrate our continuing Wendish ties with Concordia University at Austin, Texas. University President, The Rev. Dr. David Zersen, will be the guest speaker for the 8:30 a.m. English service, Bible Class, and the 10:30 a.m. German service at St. Paul Lutheran Church. Back by popular demand, for our afternoon featured entertainment will be *THE OAKWILT BOYS*, comprised of eight talented faculty and staff members at Concordia. "The Lower Sorbs (Wends) of the Cottbus Area"

Scholars differentiate two groups of Sorbs (Wends), the Upper and Lower. The Wends who came to Texas in 1854 were members of the Upper Sorbian community. The Lower Sorbs speak a language which, although closely related, is considered a distinct language. The Lower Sorbs have not preserved their language as well as have the Upper Sorbs, and the situation today in Germany is similar to that in Texas some 30-35 years ago. Lower Wendish is a language of the older generation.

World Music Camp

On Thursday, June 10th, the German/Wendish cultures were celebrated and studied. In the morning, the group took a field trip to the German Texan Heritage House in downtown Austin. Then they worked on art projects and later enjoyed Wendish Folk Tales from storyteller Charles Wukasch. In the afternoon, Evelyn Buchhorn demonstrated Wendish noodle making. While the noodles were drying, Herschel Moody played his accordion and explained various aspects of it as well as the songs he played. Representatives of the International Folk Dancers demonstrated German and Bavarian dances and then involved the students in dancing. Then the noodles were cut, dried and cooked so everyone could eat some before the camp day ended at 3 P.M. Each child truly enjoyed eating the homemade noodles. Recipes were sent home with each one as well as invitations to the Wendish Festival in September.

KASPER FAMILY REUNION

This was a special reunion as four members of the Kasper family in Germany attended. They were guests of Arnold and Evelyn Kasper who had visited with Johann and Edith Kasper in Zeiszig, Germany, 1997. Their son, Thomas, and his wife, Gudrun accompanied them to Texas.

Johann took the family back another generation to Hans Kasper, who married Magdalene Ronatschk, and was the Bürgervorsteher in Spreewitz. His son, Christian, was one of 7 children and the only one to come to Texas. He had two older brothers and therefore would not have inherited land from his parents. He, his wife, Dorothea Linack Kasper and son, Matthes, came here from Zerre. Christian and Dorothea both died at New Ulm at a very young age in 1855 leaving Matthes a young orphan of 4 ½ years.

At the reunion, Johann Kasper addressed the group talking about the area from whence the family came. Darlene Aksoy of Dallas, the daughter of Mirien Kasper Senter, was the translator.

A delicious dinner of fish fried by Gussie, Edward and David Pietsch, and Anton and Steven Lehmann was enjoyed. Family members brought side dishes and desserts.

The Christian Kasper Lehmann family will be in charge of the reunion in May 2000.

Texas Wendish Heritage Society General Meeting May 16, 1999

President Georgie Boyce called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. in the Kilian Building of the museum complex at Serbin, Texas, on Sunday, May 16, 1999.

The devotion was presented by Reverend Michael Buchhorn of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Serbin, reading from a handbook entitled, "The Swiss Society for the Promotion of Immigration." This handbook was written during the early to mid-1800's and presented a comparison of America during that era—as a place offering new beginnings, fertile lands, and boundless opportunities—versus Europe—with its lack of both opportunities and available fertile land. Pastor Buchhorn then read a letter written around 1530 by Martin Luther to his son, Hans, describing another wonderful land—our heavenly home. We should all remember to thank God for watching over our ancestors and guiding them to this new land that we now enjoy as our earthly home. He closed the devotion by leading all in singing the Doxology. He then announced that May 23 is the anniversary of the date in 1854 when the immigrant congregation issued a call to Johann Kilian to serve as their pastor, and reminded everyone to attend the Serbin Picnic on May 30.

Thrty-one members were present. Also attending the meeting as visitors were Joyce and Robert Hinze, Delbert and Carol Niemann, Tinnie Niemann, Marilyn James, Lorine Bamsch, Renata Teinert, Adela Peschel, Carol Kilgore, Nancy Kilgore, Hertha Kruse, Mannie Fritsch, Edwin Moerbe, Rachel Hildebrandt, and Edward Menville.

The minutes of the February 21, 1999 General Meeting were approved with the following correction:

Page 1, last paragraph continuing on Page 2, "Bluebonnet Electric will provide the labor and materials to set the poles" should read "Poles will be purchased by the Society and Museum and Bluebonnet Electric will set them at no cost."

No financial report was presented.

Hattie Schautschick, Noodle Committee Chairperson, reported that the Committee members have produced over 1,100 pounds of noodles thus far for 1999.

Georgie Boyce thanked E.C. Knippa and Ken Weiser for their diligent work on the billboard sign project, which is continuing successfully.

Eunice Dunk gave an update of the progress of 1999 grant applications. The Hotel/Motel tax grant application includes a request for \$5,000 to be used for advertising. The LCRA grant application requests a total of \$17,000, which would pay for further electrical and exterior improvements to the Kilian Building, and for a new copy machine.

Georgie Boyce announced that the Board approved the hiring of an assistant for Barbara Hielscher. Sandra Matthijetz has been hired to fill this position.

Evelyn Kasper reported that 17 tours have been conducted thus far for 1999. Nine tours included a luncheon and one was an all-day tour including light breakfast and luncheon. She also reported that the Texas Wendish Heritage Society participated in the recent Lee County Centennial, selling pickles, lemonade, and dry noodles. Special thanks were extended to Walter and Laverne Gersch, J.B. Gersch, George and Eunice Dunk, Ruby Koslon, Georgie Boyce, and Hattie Schautschick for volunteering with this event. Also noted was the work of Jack and Marion Wiederhold in

assembling a reproduction of the St. Paul Lutheran Church altar area, which formed the center of a display at the Lee County Centennial involving several youth portraying Johann Kilian and some early Wendish congregants.

Georgie Boyce stated that during her recent visit to Germany, she met with the President of the Domowina to discuss issues related to the Texas Wendish Heritage Society becoming an Associate (non-voting) member. The Board has agreed to a draft proposal for such an affiliation and this matter is still pending.

New business:

(a) The oak tree in the center courtyard is dying and will require removal. The Board will discuss options for accomplishing this task at their next meeting.

(b) The Presidential Corridor Regional Information Guide is now available, and includes an ad and

a well-written description of the Museum complex and its history.

(c) Wendish Fest 1999 brochures are available. Entries are needed for the noodle cook-off. The Oak Wilt Boys will perform at this year's Fest, and Jack Wiederhold and Doug Malke will conduct a German sing-along at the end of the day's program.

(d) Reprints of the Blasig book have been delivered and are available for purchased at the

Museum.

(e) Irene and Reinhold Teinert were introduced as new Life Members of the Texas Wendish Heritage Society. They were thanked for their many years of support.

(f) The Museum is currently showing a new exhibit, arranged by Daphne Garrett, focusing on

Wendish-owned businesses in the Serbin/Northrup/Warda areas.

(g) Della Mullens announced that Charles Wukasch is currently in Postdam, Germany giving a talk on the Lower Sorbian language and has offered to present a similar talk for the August 1999 General Membership meeting.

Georgie Boyce announced that her husband, Pastor Robert Boyce, has accepted a call to serve at Eden, Texas. She intends to complete the remainder of her term as President.

A motion was made and approved to adjourn the meeting at 2:55 PM with thanks given to Evelyn Kasper, Eleanor Schulze, and Irene Boriack for providing refreshments. Georgie Boyce then introduced Rachel Hildebrandt, the program speaker, who gave a most interesting talk on what she learned and experienced while working at the Sorbische Institute in Bautzen, Germany for several months at the end of 1998.

WENDS REPRESENTED AT LEE COUNTY COURTHOUSE CENTENNIAL.






CONTEST GUIDELINES

- The Noodle Cook-off is open to all interested
- Pre-registration is encouraged by Sept. 20.
- There is no contest entry fee and no entry fee to the Wendish Fest grounds.
- Noodle entries must be made by one person (no team entries).
- Noodles must be made by the contestant, and cooked by the contestant.
- An entry must consist of the following:
 - 1 quart plastic bag of dry noodles (for display only)
 - A minimum of 4 cups cooked noodles in broth
- 7. The noodles should be cooked prior to arrival and should be kept HOT for the noodle tasting (a slow-cooker is suggested).
- 8. One electrical outlet will be provided for
- 9. Contestants must provide their own card table and at least a 25-foot extension cord.
- 10. Participants may enter the Noodle Cook-off with either a decorative display or noodle pot only. All entries will be judged on TASTE, not display. No previous awards may

be displayed in either category:

- A. Decorative Display participants may create a decorative table display for the noodles. The display is only to draw interest to the Noodle Cook-off, and will not be judged.
- B. Noodle Pot Only participants may choose to bring only a pot of noodles and an extension cord for a group display.
- 11. Registration will be held at 1:00 p.m.
- 12. Judging will begin at 1:30 p.m.
- 13. Awards will be presented at 2:30 p.m. Pictures and presentation of trophies will be made at this time.
- 14. The tasting party will begin following the judging. Participants will serve their noodles to the public. Tasting supplies will be supplied by the planning committee.
- 15. The following trophies will be presented: First place - Trophy and \$200 cash Second place - Trophy and \$100 cash Third place — Trophy and \$50 cash All contestants - participant ribbons


